Votes of thanks were passed to the London Philatelic Society, and to Mr. J. T. Milburn, a member of the local Society, for gifts of philatelic works.


The next general meeting will be held on the second Tuesday in December, when the stamps of Great Britain will form the subject of study.





### **Frank Soutar**

I am saddened to have to report the passing of another Congress Medallist, Frank Soutar, who received the Medal in 2009 in Manchester.

Frank did all he could to promote philately to young people. His name was synonymous with 'Youth'. In 1995 to 1997 he was a member of the National Youth Stamp Committee which held seminars to discuss ways to improve youth activities. In Scotland he took on the task of visiting numerous schools to promote the hobby. This was formalised in 1994 when he was appointed Youth Officer for the Association of Scottish Philatelic Societies. He became a qualified Youth Judge. His Youth Work led him to collaborate on a project 'Stamp IT' with the initiative to revitalise stamp collecting within Girlguiding.



His activities for youth were diverse and included a Wildlife Stamp weekend at Edinburgh Zoo in 2006. This was very successful and was the beginning of further annual events. When a Youth Activities Co-ordinator was needed for GLASGOW 2000, the 3<sup>rd</sup> ABPS Biennial Exhibition, Frank was the first choice. His efforts gained him a well-deserved Rowland Hill Award in 2001.

Frank was always in demand to sit on and head committees. In 1998 he was appointed Chairman of the ABPS Public Relations Committee and he served on the ABPS Awards Committee.

In recognition of his record of service he was appointed an Honorary Life Vice-President of the ABPS. Frank Soutar was a kind, knowledgeable and helpful person. His capacity for hard work was acknowledged throughout the hobby.

### Jan G Simons FRPSL 1927-2024

Jan Simons, who died on 1<sup>st</sup> June aged 98, was a Dutch dentist who, with his Scottish wife Edith, came on his retirement to live in England. He had collected the stamps and postal history



items of Japan from early adulthood, buying in post-war Holland at a time when few others sought them and when prices were minimal.

Under the mentorship of the expert **Willem Metzelaar** he built up an extensive collection of both the Dragon stamps and other classic stamps of early Japan, collaborating with Metzelaar and **Varro E Tyler** in the production of the ISJP Monogram on the *Forgeries of the Dragon issues*. Eventually though he sold his Dragons and his other stamps in order to concentrate on and collect covers to and from Japan especially those relating to the IJPOs in Manchuria and Korea.

Jan joined the British Society for Japanese Philately (BSJP) and the ISJP in the 1970s, and the RPSL a little later becoming a Fellow in due course. Unfortunately dyslexic, he nevertheless did much to pass on his extensive knowledge with contributions to the Society of Postal Historians and to many detailed articles written by **Ken Clark**, the BSJP Editor, in their journal Kiku Shimbun. He was Chairman & President of the BSJP up to the time of his passing.

In Japan in 2012 he received a medal for his competitive entry of Changchun cancels & covers. He also travelled to the Sindelfingen fairs in Germany and regularly shared knowledge with **Florian Eichhorn**, Bundesprüfer in Germany for the stamps of Japan and other Japanese philatelic items, with whom he had ongoing contact over the years.

A familiar figure on the BSJP stand at MIDPEX, at the Oxford and Amersham Philatelic Societies, and other events, plus the BSJP evening meetings at the Gunmakers and later the Kings Arms in Marylebone; he was an extremely friendly pleasant gentleman who would always encourage and converse easily with others of like interests; he will be much missed by his philatelic contacts.

About The Author ► Andrew found his Father's stamps at the age of 10. A year later at Senior School he immediately joined the School Stamp Club. He 'specialised'(I) in British, but soon was interested in Queen Victoria which he could not afford. The 2nd to last boy wearing short trousers in his school year, he religiously bought Post Office New Issues on Tuesdays with his pocket money. He soon found that he enjoyed swapping / trading stamps as much as collecting them. Aged 19, eschewing University he quickly found a philatelic career in London, leading to creating his own companies in stamps. Andrew has authored many internationally published Stamp 'Tips' articles, appearing on Local Radio and National TV promoting Philately with Alan Titchmarsh. Andrew's area of expertise is unusual - in so far as his grounding in collecting and wide philatelic knowledge has given him a deep understanding of Philately. He has studied Philately for the past 51 years, in combination with Commerce and Marketing Expertise, enabling him to create synergies in 'lifetime' interlinked Stamp Selling Systems, selling unit-priced stamps through to handling collections & Rarities up to £700,000 each. Today Andrew is fortunate to be co-owner with his Wife, of Universal Philatelic Auctions (aka UPA) - the Largest No Buyer's Premium Reducing-Estimate System Stamp Auction in the World, creating records selling stamps to 2.261 different bidders

from 54 different countries "in his international auctions.
Andrew stopped collecting stamps aged 18 reasoning that his enjoyment of stamps would be in handling them and solling them... He loves working in stamps

Three years later, attending my first public stamp auctions I wondered how some bidders seemed to buy everything, paying the highest price? ...but did it really? What was the real reason? How could a Dealer pay a higher price than a Collector? It doesn't make sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless... for a Collector, this was...

Wrong Presentation Wrong Place X
therefore Wrong Price X

**3** Fast-forward 48 years later to a British Empire collection, lot #1 in an International Stamp Auction – Estimated at £3,000, but we were the highest bidder at £21,000 – YES – some 7×higher. Including Buyer's Premium in the extraordinary sum of £4,788 we actually paid GBP£25,788= upon a £3,000 estimate... however, we broke it down into sets, singles, minicollections etc. We made a profit. Some might say it found its price. Others may say:

Wrong Estimate X Wrong Presentation X
Wrong StructureX Wrong Protection of Price X

– Lucky for the seller that 2 well-heeled bidders saw the potential value that day or it could have been given away... the seller could easily have lost out couldn't he? or she?

So, by un-peeling the layers of obfuscation, hopefully we can all agree:

The Secret is Simple –
it's ALL ABOUT: TIMING
Plus the 3 Philatelic 'P's –

Presentation Place V and Price V

4 Understanding the problem... always remember the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea, I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion' in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there...

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied — "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my answer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy more collector clients than any other stamp auction

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover – up to £200,000 per annum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell £200K per annum).

5 Why is that? Because, as the world revolved the Stamp Market, imperceptibly Changed, and incrementally -Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock – but absent collectors in

the place they choose to sell their stamps in. Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our former competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 77th Auction we had 1,793 different bidders from 49 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other well-advertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them - you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive...

Now, let's examine the cost implications - Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for £800. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays £1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into £2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the £800 sale price. This is GBP£144. Therefore you receive approaching £656 - which is approximately 33% of the dealer's £2,000+/- retail selling price - BUT... now that we have identified the problem...

> Isn't the Solution Staring us Right in The Face ?

Why Pay an Auction to Sell to Dealers: Sell to Collectors instead? In our example with buyer's premium, sellers commission, lotting fees, extra credit card charges, VAT and even insurance - you're already being charged in different ways up to 40% of the selling price to sell, possibly or probably, to the wrong person.

Why not direct that 40% cost you're paying to sell to Collectors instead? Sounds good, so why hasn't this been done before?

8 Truth is, it Has been done before...Sometimes the 'old' ways are the best ways aren't they? But in today's enthusiasm to obscure the

obvious so that money may be taken, almost surreptitiously, in numerous different ways, (without us apparently noticing until we see the cheque in our pocket) - the transparent 'seller pays' has been deliberately 'obscured' - so much so that, amazingly, the latest 2017 European Auction Selling Legislation just introduced - now requires auctions that charge 'buyer's premiums' to warn the buyer in advance. Just imagine going into the petrol station, and being warned that the price you're paying to put fuel in you tank is not the real price, you have to pay a premium! Obviously, there would be an uproar...

9 How can you cut out the middleman and sell Collectors instead? Well, I can think of two ways. 1). DIY - Do It Yourself selling on eBay. That may be fine for lower grade material - but, would you risk auctioning relatively unprotected rare material on eBay ? We don't and we're professionals, so we should know what we're doing. Or 2). Cut out the extra middle-man. Use my company UPA, which reaches collectors instead. Here's how it works: Continuing from our previous Example:

The auction sold your stamps to a dealer for £1,000 - but You received circa £656

UPA sells them to collectors for you for up to £2,000 – even after 40% commission you receive up to £1,200. Up to £544 more. Now that's amazing, isn't it?

Sounds Good Andrew, but Can You 'Deliver'? Obviously, nothing is as simple as that, and as we auction stamps to collectors some collections may 'break' to the example £2,000+/- but the stamps may be sold for more or less - especially as we reserve all lots at 20% below, (Estimate £2,000 = £1,600 reserve) and not everything sells first or even 2nd time so prices may come down... Naturally, it's not that straightforward for a dealer either - he may sell at a discount to 'move' stock OR, like many dealers he may be sitting on the same unsold stamps, that you see time and time again, in dealer's stocks years later and still at the same unattractive prices... So, I think it is more reasonable for you to expect up to 36% to 50% more, indirectly or directly via my Collector's

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# Salisbury's Views on PUBLICITY with comments from Michael Moody Image

Every avenue has to be explored. But firstly we have to change our image. Philately is dynamic and changing, not the image of nerds etc that we have. (At the moment we can't change the old men image!) It doesn't just include collecting stamps and fly specks great as we know that is. Postal History, postcards, social philately, thematics, local history are just some of our interests. We know all this but that is not our image. There are many people interested/involved in these areas who have never contemplated 'stamp collecting' who could become to greater or lesser extent philatelists. We have to appeal to a new audience.

**Comment:** A daughter had a look at my social philately collection and pronounced it surprisingly very interesting and not what she expected.

#### **Avenues**

These are some that have been suggested. I am sure there are many more which other societies have tried. Most of these SDPS has tried and in some cases I have put our experience as a comment.

**Flyers at Stamp Fairs.** Displayed on a prominent table and ideally a member at the desk at Stamp Fairs. **Comment** we did this with partial manning and a display at the recent Salisbury Stamp Fair. 18 flyers, which inter alia contained full contact and website details, were taken. Response Nil.

**Flyers at Dealers.** We are lucky to have Dauwalders in Salisbury. Ten years ago we had flyers there and free copies of the newsletters. **Comment** We stopped as no members joined as a result of this. We are now trying again.

**Newspapers.** Our local newspaper used to have a column for local societies reports. They have now stopped that. **Comment.** We had a monthly report in that column but it gained no new members. We are now going to approach the local free newspapers for a one off. Unfortunately while free papers are free to readers they are often not free to advertisers.

**Parish Magazines.** Again these like you paying for advertisements. However, as secretary of another society I managed to get information in six magazines at a reasonable cost. We are now trying this approach. **Comment** An article was placed last year in the parish magazine of the area where we meet with no results.

**Talks.** We are now considering talking to societies such as U3A, Rotary and our Local History Society, all of whom have potential members. **Comment** It is not easy finding members to talk. We did speak at a U3A meeting ten years ago with no results.

**Schools.** We tried this a few years ago and were met by indifference and usually no reply.

**Duke of Edinburgh's Awards.** Three years ago a young person came to our meetings as a part of his D of E awards. We helped him with his submission, which got him his qualification. **Comment** We never saw him again in spite of following up.

**Websites.** It is likely that the great majority of societies have one. In this day and age it is essential. **Comment.** SDPS has had a website for a long time and it is continually kept up to date with reports of meetings etc. It has produced new members as it is the first port of call for newcomers to the area. But it is rarely visited even by members. I am hoping in a month or so to get from google analytics some viewing figures.

### Facebook and/or Equivalent

Non-philatelic societies to which I belong have a Facebook presence. These tend to be well used and informative. I know there are forums out there for some specialist philatelic societies. **Comment.** They are however either international or specialist and I am not sure how relevant they are for a local society.

This is the final section of the report from Michael and various members of Salisbury & District and other philatelic contacts. I am very grateful for their response and careful thought. I am disappointed that there have been no responses. Do you have thoughts on this or previous reports, things to add, things that have worked or haven't? So thank you Michael and Salisbury etc over to the silent majority!

### Colin Tabeart RDP

ABPS is very pleased to announce that the FEPA Medal for Exceptional Philatelic Study and Research 2023 has been awarded to its nominee Colin Tabeart RDP for his book British Long Distance Mail Packets Volume 2 The Harwich Packets 1816-1834, Rates Routes and Ships Out and Home.

This is a detailed study of Harwich packets based on original research from newspapers of the time. This book aims to show how



packet mails between the United Kingdom and northern Europe travelled during the final years of the sailing packets era, and how such letters were rated. The various markings used by despatching and destination postal authorities and transit markings collected en route have largely been covered in other works and, in the context of this book, have only been used to confirm dates, thereby allowing the mode of transportation to be determined. With this book a collector should be able to determine by what route a letter travelled, how it was rated, and in most cases what ship or ships carried the mail. The earlier volume covers the period 1793-1815.

# Royal Tunbridge Wells Philatelic Society has been awarded a FEPA Certificate of Appreciation for Outstanding Activities for the Promotion of Philately.



The Royal Tunbridge Wells Philatelic Society was established in 1945 and holds 22 daytime meetings each year. In addition to local members the society attracts members from further afield such as Maidstone, Heathfield, Orpington and Bexhill.

In the early 2000s, Tunbridge Wells was one of the first local societies to have daytime meetings, with one a month held in a local pub. Facing declining attendance in 2018, the society

shifted to all daytime meetings in 2019. During the 2020 Covid pandemic, they successfully transitioned to Zoom meetings, maintaining participation levels. The experience of the Zoom meetings is pointing the way to how the society will respond to the ever-changing demographics and circumstances.

The society's activities focus on sociable and inclusive philatelic meetings. Following meetings, many members stay for lunch at the pub, which gives them the opportunity to chat with the speaker.

The other major activity which the society organises is the popular Crowborough Stamp Fair.

After Covid, the society upgraded its website to make it more accessible, simpler to navigate and easier to update. Future plans involve enhancing their website as a philatelic resource, for example, by featuring highlights from society displays, aspects of members' collections, papers and research of philatelic importance. The society is also considering ways to include one or two more potentially 'social-philatelic' displays each year to attract a wider and possibly non-philatelic audience.

Whatever the outcome, friendship, enjoyment and broadening the society's philatelic experience will remain paramount.

# South Georgia, Falkland Island Dependencies. Duncan Carse's 1961 Castaway Experiment.

Readers of a certain age may remember the popular radio weekday serial programme Dick Barton Special Agent. Each night listeners would be entertained with the adventures of Dick and his two companions Jock and Snowy. Dick Barton was played by Duncan Carse who besides being an actor/broadcaster was also an Antarctic explorer and an authority on the island of South Georgia.

In 1961 he attempted to live alone for 18 months on South Georgia, his base being at Undine Harbour on the South-West side of the Island which has a climate of near freezing temperatures with frequent and violent gales and persistent cloud and snow at sea-level for six months of the year. His experiment to live alone lasted just a few months due to a tidal wave sweeping inland on the  $20^{th}$  May, destroying his base hut and spoiling much of his gear. He salvaged the basic essentials and remained a further 116 days before being rescued by the sealer *Petrel* and taken back to Grytviken and subsequently to the United Kingdom.

### Is it real? Who knows?

There has been a lot of comment in the press recently about counterfeit stamps. Whilst accepting that there seem to be a lot of forgeries flooding into the country, customers could be forgiven for expecting the Post Office to be able to recognise its own products with some degree of certainty. I wonder just how many hundreds of people have fallen foul of their failure to do so.

There appears to have been a particularly assiduous and sceptical employee in North Yorkshire last December – although said official might have been in Sheffield, where all the mail from Hull is now processed (how is that economical... but don't get me started on that subject). In mid-February we received back a Christmas card which had been refused by a friend in Guisborough because he would have had to pay £5 for the privilege of receiving our good wishes. (Nowadays we write our postcode and house number on the back of correspondence in the hope that if it cannot be delivered it will be returned, alerting us to the fact that the potential recipient may have moved or worse, during the year.)

The envelope, which had been slit open, bears a sticker stating that the stamp is

ears a sticker stating that the stamp is counterfeit, and has had the address scribbled out. Our postcode facilitated the return. On March 1<sup>st</sup>, another card refused by other friends, also in Guisborough, arrived, this time in a Royal Mail First class envelope addressed to 'The Occupier', with our full address. This had suffered the same fate, though it had not been opened. The two original covers had the date of 15.12.23 written on them and were numbered 4 and 5.

The stamps on both these items had been bought over the counter at our local Post Office in early December. The matrix part of the stamps is quite prominent and the phosphor bands are very clear. If we *had* used counterfeit stamps with nefarious intent, how likely is it that we would have put clear return information on the covers allowing the items to be traced back to us? The items were

returned without any demand for payment or query on delivery, which seems a little strange. One also wonders why it took so long for the items to be returned.





Do we now need to keep post office receipts in case we ever have to prove where stamps were bought? The system is in serious need of a shake-up. It could be a long wait.

### **Channel Islands Specialists'**

Our Spring meeting with postal and room auction was held on 20<sup>th</sup> April. The theme for members' displays was *Transport*. A variety of subjects were shown by **Jon Aitchison**, **Julian Bagwell**, **Gerald Marriner**, **Simon Burke**, **Mark Bailey**, **David Winnie** and **Richard Flemming**. Auctioneer **Nick Stuart** 

commented: "This general auction, with over 720 lots, covered early Postal History, WWI, Occupation (Postal History, Bisects, stamps, Red Cross messages, *Feldpost*, Internee and POW Mail), Jethou, Brecqhou, Herm and Sark as well as modern Postal History and stamps and revenues plus a wide range of postcards. The reserves were from £2 to £300 and attracted 80 bidders, with lots supplied by 32 vendors. The auction generated sales of £14 494. Many of the lots sold for around their reserves; however as usual several lots resulted in some fierce

bidding, especially in the room. Highlights included an 1841 entire from Jersey to Hawick via London with a fine fourmargin Penny Black cancelled with a Maltese

Cross which sold for £350; a QV 10/- stamp (SG183) with a fine Guernsey parcel post cancel which went for £150; a Red Cross message form from America, which did not have the German Red Cross handstamp applied and was received in





Geneva on 28<sup>th</sup> June 1944, which went for £300 and a very rare Herm slogan meter mark with a reserve of £100 which was, after frenetic bidding, sold for £475. Our next postal auction will be held in October 2024.

### Helvetia



The American Civil War, which lasted from April 1861 until April 1865, was fought over the question of slavery. President Abraham Lincoln, elected in 1860, was opposed to the expansion of slavery. Over the next few months, a total of eleven states in the south, disagreeing with his views, left the Union to form the Confederate States of America. The impact of the war on the postal services was explained in a presentation and magnificent display given in June by Daniel J Ryterband FRPSL. Daniel made the effect on the posts very clear.

### South African Collectors'

In April we held another day meeting at Letchworth Garden City with a number of interesting displays presented and an excellent buffet lunch provided. You do not need to be a member to join us there. This year we held our annual

In April Giles du Boulay visited to show Danzig -Trains and Boats and Planes. He started with the development of the railways to and through Danzig with associated anecdotes. He continued with sea mail showing postcards, postal history, stamps, tickets, cigarette cards. This included SMS "Danzig" and the Seedienst Ost Prussia line, whose three ships were used for the "Strength Through Joy" cruises and which were all lost in one night on a Polish minefield whilst themselves being used as minelayers! Part two was devoted to airmails, starting with an 1897 balloon flight over Danzig from Leipzig. Early aircraft flights and airmail stamps were followed by Danzig mail used on Atlantic catapult flights and the Dornier DoX flying boat. Mention was made of a scam in which the post office charged

express mail supplements for all incoming airmail even if no real time benefit was gained. **Steve Alpe** returned to show more of his collections. This time, his dominant theme was *Public Houses, Beers and Breweries*. He included a large series of Great Britain first day covers featuring a public house relevant to at least one of the stamps in the set. **Derek Connell** collects *London*. He began

with a range of Corsini letters, the earliest being from 1574. The introduction of dated postmarks by Henry Bishop in 1661 was followed by the London local post of William Dockwra. Addresses were very descriptive until house numbers were first assigned in 1767.





## Croydon

Pauline told of his life in Plymouth and London, and his death at the Savoy - to be taken out in a rolled-up carpet. **Graham Harker** then gave a display of *Controls*. The stamps from the reigns of Edward VII, George V and Elizabeth II were shown as plate or cylinder blocks. In the margins of the sheets there are controls – numbers and letters – as well as cylinder numbers. The control was introduced in 1882 by the printing firm De La Rue as an accounting method. The Post Office has continued to use the system as a means of stock control and accounting. The stamps shown were all mint, both unmounted and mounted. Following the display several members present at the meeting spoke about how they had taken up stamp collecting as a hobby – **Terry Page, Dave Meaney, Peter Collier, Pauline MacBroom, Michael Sneary** and **Frank Simpson.** The meeting concluded with a talk by **Richard West.** Following

In May Peter Chadwick presented Oddities in GB Postal History Pre-1840. Beginning with Early Postal History of England he outlined how a public postal service was initiated in 1660. Originally organised by Henry Bishop (hence the 'Bishop' mark) along the main 'post roads', and mainly serving ports, post only went to the post office in a town. In theory, all mail went to London, was sorted, and then went out to the recipient's town. The charges for the two journeys were added together. About 1685, "way posts" meant mail between two points on the same road did not have to go through London and then 'bye posts' and 'cross posts' were introduced by 1800. Peter continued with Early Post Roads & Post Offices in Scotland – with the first publically accessible post from London to Edinburgh, on horseback, introduced in 1660, followed by Glasgow, by foot, in 1661 and Stranraer and Portpatrick, for Ireland, in 1662. This service was for the convenience of the English court and army rather than the Scots' needs. There was minimal service north of the Great Glen before 1700. We held our AGM in June, followed by a One-Sheet Competition, won by Charles Squire with 1971 Machin Definitives. Charles went on to give a display on Machin Definitives from 1967 to 1971. which included decimalisation in February 1971 and the effects of the national postal strike. It was well illustrated with individual

mint stamps, booklets and first day covers. → jtaylor3@ntlworld.com

#### Hull

The final part of this season's programme has had a distinctly Scottish flavour, starting with some highly detailed postal history of *Early Mail Routes in Scotland* along with stories of the tribulations of those who carried it, brought to life for us by **Peter Chadwick**. The following month we saw part of **Mike Kentzer**'s *Mail into Scotland from Abroad between 1813 and 1839*, showing some very unusual sources, including St Kitts, Little Rock, Arkansas and St Helena. Mike's second half featured *Scarborough*, *Whitby and the Railway in Between*. **Stephen Parkin** completed our Scotlish education with a comprehensive look at *Midlothian Postal History*. **Daphne McMillan** presented *Varieties on the GB Commemoratives of King George VI*, introducing the varieties on screen for



clarity. Society member **Barry Clark**'s display on *Telegraphs* outlined the rise of private telegraph companies before their nationalisation in 1870. We saw a range of Telegraph stamps printed by de la Rue, which were eventually replaced by postage stamps, with all the dies being destroyed except for the £5 value, where 'Revenue' was removed and 'Postage' added. He later showed a very attractive collection of greetings telegrams, some designed by famous artists, notably Whistler, who was killed in World War II. An item with local significance was a greeting

sent from a trawler by radio to Wick and thence by telegraph to Hull. We ended the season with a relaxed 'Bring, buy and discussion' afternoon complete with cake.

#### Launceston

In May members enjoyed a display by fellow member Des Kent entitled Bude. Stratton and Beyond. Des began by showing a card with stamp affixed; both depicting Guillaume Bude, a French scholar, (1457-1540). Getting closer to the Bude in North Cornwall, an envelope with a fine example of a barred numeral 442 postmark was shown, followed by a British Expeditionary Force letter sent from France to a lady in Bude. A postcard which generated some discussion was sent by the Bude

Philatelic Society to a member in 1949, and despite Des making extensive

enquiries, little had been established about the society. A selection of material was shown relating to the Penny Farthing Post which was established by a local Bude resident on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2012 in protest at Royal Mail raising the first class letter rate to 60p. but, it was short-lived because of its popularity! A very early pre-stamp cover from London bearing a 'Stratton Strand' receiving mark drew some interest from members. Finally Des showed covers with cancellations of villages around Bude from Crackington Haven to Morwenstow. The *Beyond* part of the display included a selection of covers of French Colonies, Namibia and pre- and post-the amalgamation of the seven Trucial States, which later became the United Arab Emirates. In June **Terry Mounce** presented his display in two parts – *British Revenue Stamps* and *Kernow Stamps*. The first part included a document drawn up for the purpose of committing an individual to a lunatic asylum.

#### Leeds

Since April we have held four meetings which concluded with our AGM and a mini display on May 28<sup>th</sup> by our vice president **Richard Jagielski**. In April **Nigel Grizzard** gave a fascinating display of *Bradford Postal History* which extended from the West Riding to the continent and more. In the second part he talked about the future of the UK stamp trade. Later **Bill Pipe** took us into *The History of Railway stamps* beginning with the 1838 act which allowed parcels and mail. He led us through Victorian times up to 1891. In May **Chris Jones** gave us an interesting talk on *Developments and Deviations in the Cancellation of GB prepaid Mail*. He spoke of the PO regulations of 1840–1860 for GB and Ireland. Regulations began 6<sup>th</sup> May 1840. An interesting fact he described was how the postmasters mixed their own ink. Red ink was problematic but London had black ink by 31<sup>st</sup> August 1840. In February 1841 a change was made centrally and all POs used black ink. Several members enjoyed a guided walk of

Bradford organised by Nigel Grizzard. Sadly a number of members were on holiday. We look forward to meeting members at a garden afternoon tea and chatting all things philatelic in August. Our 2024 -25 season will begin on 10<sup>th</sup>

#### Rochdale

We regret to report the unexpected death of **Ken Knight**, our president for many years. Ken was a stamp dealer and a specialist in Egyptian postal history. He will be deeply missed. Our member Pete Best presented a talk on Maltese Stamps. Its location in the Eastern Mediterranean made it a crossroads in philatelic seaborne traffic between Europe, Africa and the Middle East. This unique position created a complexity of postage rates not helped by the many forwarding agents involved in seaborne traffic. In-bound ships to Malta when illness was detected had to be completely quarantined for 91 days between Valletta and the small outlying Bishops Island, which housed an isolation hospital at the harbour's entrance. The guarantined postal items were perforated to allow a disinfection agent to permeate the contents. Early adhesive stamps were printed with fugitive ink. Consequently it is difficult to identify shade variations due to running colours. Peter completed his talk by showing many types of Maltese postcards, letters, registered letters and newspaper wrappers. Our evening's entertainment in June consisted of members' presentations. We began with French Stamps depicting Parisian Landmarks. A selection of New Zealand Coil Stamps began with the first issues in 1930 of commemoratives. Maltese Overprints and Revenue Stamps included many boarding passes and passports with attached revenue stamps to cover airport taxes. A collection of WWI Commemorative Stamp Sheets included topics from major battles. Finally we saw one member's Malaysia and its Stamps and heard native bird song Peter Grimshaw recordinas!


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## The Island of Nauru and a Masterclass on GB Overprints



Robert Stein's 'British King George V Definitive Profile Head and Seahorse Stamps Overprinted for Nauru' deserves a second look, particularly if you are a collector of GB Overprints.

Nauru, a coral island of about 8 sq miles, is located 800 miles northeast of the Solomon Islands, in the Pacific Ocean. Settled by Micronesians around 1000 BC, the island was discovered in 1798 by John Fearn, who named it Pleasant Island. In the 1830's Europeans began to live there, the first being escaped convicts Patrick Burke and John Jones. The settlers introduced firearms and alcohol and this led to wars between the previously peaceful tribes of the island. In 1886 the Anglo-German Declaration (by the British and German Empires), granted Nauru to Germany. The

Germans annexed Nauru in the German Marshall Islands Protectorate; the first post office, used by Nauru in 1888, was in fact based in Jaluit. German Marshall Island stamps were used. In 1899 phosphate was discovered and Arundel & Co of Sydney were awarded a contract. Excavation led to exports from 1907, and in 1908 a first post office opened on Nauru.

Germany declared war on 4<sup>th</sup> August 1914 and British subjects were deported to Ocean Island. On 9<sup>th</sup> September Australia seized the island on behalf of the British Empire. Germany formally surrendered Nauru on 9<sup>th</sup> November. Thereafter, from 1914 to 1916, Australian stamps overprinted North West Pacific Islands were used. The British took control of the island in October 1916 at which time British GRV stamps began to be used, overprinted Nauru.

In 1924 Nauru became a mandated British territory, from which point the island has used its own Nauru stamps.

The stamps used between October 1916 and March 1924 offer a comprehensive case study of production (design, paper, ink, printing) and distribution of the King George V Profile Head (½d to 1s) and Seahorse (2s 6d to 10s) stamps of Great Britain overprinted for use in Nauru.

Robert's beautifully crafted *British King George V Definitive Profile Head and Seahorse Stamps Overprinted for Nauru* provides a comprehensive education in the GB Overprint Process. In 276 pages, it details how the production of British stamps was supervised by the GB Inland Revenue Stamping Department. Profile Head controls are key to the study. They establish a chronological series of samples to which other stamps were organised and compared. The Nauru sample included all press runs believed to survive. The book identifies all the individual printings within the controls of the time. 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

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
