

#### **Notes FROM THE CHAIR:**

Looking back on 2024, ABPS can be proud of the continuing support it is giving to philately in the UK. In particular, the website has had a complete review with updates to the Speakers List, the start of a new section called "Learn" to encourage new and intermediate collectors (watch this for future new content coming soon) and regular news features to inform collectors as well as a general clean-up by archiving older content. Mike Hoffman, as our new webmaster, will take developments forward in the coming year. The ABPS also stepped in to provide meeting facilities for specialist societies at Stampex with all six sessions taken. The re-location of the national competitions went well with over 400 people visiting the displays in London at the Royal Philatelic Society. There



has also been continuing financial support to Stamp Active, small grants to societies and much more. ABPS News remains the showcase for all that is going on and thanks to Keith Burton for all his hard work in putting together four issues every year. It does provide information and ideas for programme secretaries as well as sharing best practice. Thanks, of course, to all those who contribute articles and reports. All of the Executive Committee are volunteers and they have played their part in supporting philately in the UK in 2024 and my personal thanks to all.

Stampex, organised by the Philatelic Traders' Society (PTS), moved successfully to its new location within the Business Design Centre. It was well attended and clearly showed that philately is alive and kicking.

Looking to 2025, this is going to be an even bigger year for UK philately. The big event will be the International Exhibition in Birmingham which is taking place at the NEC from 7<sup>th</sup> to 11<sup>th</sup> May in Hall 9. It is easily accessible by road and rail. Birmingham International Rail Station is on site! Virtually all the dealer booths have been sold, so it will be bigger than Stampex. There will also be around 2000 frames of exhibits (all taken up), so the opportunity to see some of the best collections in the world. There is also a whole programme of society meetings, events such as the RDP presentation and a one-day ABPS Congress. Thanks to Jon Aitchison and his team for all their hard work in putting the event together. It is an opportunity not to be missed. His presentations on Trinidadian philatelic subjects were epic, and he always went out of his way to support and encourage fledgling members.

#### John Francis Roe 1947-2024

Bristol Philatelic Society members were shocked to hear that John Roe had succumbed to a late Cancer diagnosis. He passed away shortly thereafter – heart-felt condolences went to his wife and three children. The ceremony held at The Memorial Woodlands on 28<sup>th</sup> November was a celebration of his life. The celebrant and John's two sons gave good account followed by a poem delivered by his daughter.



John was an active member at BPS (Redland and Woodlands), being the president for 2000

-2002 and then 2014-2015, also volunteering at the Bath Postal Museum continuing through its closure right up until mid-August. For the 2023-24 season he had amassed eleven cups won at competitions – nine with the BPS and two with WDPF (Wiltshire & District Philatelic Federation). He was particularly keen on Lilacs and Greens, Crash Airmail and Cinderellas having presented at numerous venues including the Royal Philatelic Society London and also contributing to the Stanley Gibbons Monthly magazine where his articles appeared from time to time. He was down to do a presentation at BPS in April 2025 on *Airmails to 1939*.

Words used to describe him include – well-versed in a good number of subjects; pleasant; had a good sense of humour; would be missed for his regular superb displays; competitive; possessing a brilliant mind. Summing up – a good man who enjoyed digging into the past and sharing his findings through both presenting and competing. Very active - he will be missed.

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# MV Georgic & the "10 Pound Pom" Emigration Scheme to Australia.1949

Whilst browsing on eBay, looking to find any covers/postcards that had a history





and told a story I came across a postcard of HMT *Georgic*, a British Troop Transport Ship which operated from 1940 to 1948 and 1953 to 1955. With the requirements for troop transport reducing and the demand for emigrants to Australia & New Zealand increasing it was decided to restore *Georgic* to her original civilian service, she having been a Transatlantic liner from 1932 to 1940 before she was requisitioned by the Admiralty. She was badly damaged by the Luftwaffe in a bombing raid on Port Tewfik, Egypt, in 1941 and had to be returned and rebuilt in her original Belfast Shipyard.

Her appearance was altered in the rebuild, her original two funnels being reduced to one.

The rebuilt 'MV 'Georgic' 'was the first all-British migrant ship which left Liverpool in Britain on the 11<sup>th</sup> January 1949 and arrived at Station Pier in Port Melbourne, Australia on the 12<sup>th</sup> February 1949. The *Georgic* operated for the UK-Australia Emigrant Service from January 1949 to October 1953 and 1954/55.



The above postcard was sent by a passenger on board the *Georgic* on the ship's first voyage for the Emigration Service to Australia in January 1949. The postcard bears a London FS Machine Cancellation dated the 27<sup>th</sup> January 1949 with a 'Paquebot Posted at Sea' boxed cachet. The passenger writes on the 12<sup>th</sup> January to thank the recipient for the send off and says that "they are having a fine time on board and that the sun had been shining beautiful that day" The



British émigrés were to become known colloquially as "10 Pound Poms" due to the charge of £10 in processing fees to migrate to Australia.

# EuroPhilEx Birmingham 2025



The international stamp exhibition, EuroPhilEx Birmingham 2025, will be hosted by the United Kingdom, and will be held at the National Exhibition Centre in Birmingham from Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> May until Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> May 2025.

The National Exhibition Centre is easy to reach with Birmingham International Station and Birmingham International Airport both close by. There are frequent and fast connections with the centre of Birmingham and to Coventry. The venue is situated close to several motorway junctions, and has 16 500 car parking spaces with shuttle buses to the venue.

On the opening day, 7<sup>th</sup> May, the exhibition will be open from 11am to 6pm, and admission will cost £10, with early bird admission from 10am for £20. On all other days admission will be free, the exhibition being open from 10am to 6pm on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, and from 10am to 4pm on Sunday, 11<sup>th</sup> May.

There will be over 60 dealers present, including a stand for Royal Mail. In addition there will be 2000 frames of exhibits from more than 30 countries. The classes being shown are: FEPA Grand Prix Class, Traditional Philately, Postal History, Aerophilately, Revenues, Postal Stationery, Thematic Philately, Open Philately, Picture Postcard, Maximaphily, Astrophilately, plus Philatelic Literature.

There will be a free souvenir sheet for visitors every day, while special cachets and cancellations will also be in use.

• Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> May will be Society Showcase Day, with societies having tables (some still available at £20 plus VAT). Several societies will also be holding meetings during the event (rooms still available at £150 plus VAT).

Other events during the exhibition will include:

- The Signing Ceremony of The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists (Friday 9<sup>th</sup> May);
- Annual Congress of the Association of British Philatelic Societies (Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> May);
- Federation of European Philatelic Societies (FEPA) Congress (Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> May)
- Auction by Cavendish Philatelic Auctions (Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> May).

#### Court of Honour not to be missed

Star attraction will be the unique British Guiana 1c black on magenta of 1856, which is kindly being shown courtesy of Stanley Gibbons Ltd.

Other exhibits in the Court of Honour will include the following:

- An exhibit of early writing, starting from 5000 year-old cuneiform tablets, brought together from the collections of James Grimwood-Taylor, Bill Hedley, Jon Aitchison and others.
- Bill Hedley will also be showing The Merchants of Venice, Trade and Administration in the Golden Age of La Serenissima covering the 14<sup>th</sup> to 17<sup>th</sup> centuries.
- Howard Hughes will be showing The Maltese Cross markings of Great Britain,
- Joseph Hackmey will display Classic France and Classic Romania.
- Stampless Maritime Overweight Mail in pre-GPU times (1838-1876) will be shown by Paul Wijnants,
- Hany Salam will display early Egyptian Maritime Postal History.
- The exhibit from **Chris Harman** will feature *Classic British Empire Perkins, Bacon issues: the Chalon head design*,
- **Geoffrey Lewis** will display his exceptional *Mail routes in the Atlantic, Pacific and Indian Oceans, plus the routes between the oceans.*

## Also on display throughout the exhibition will be the original five parchment rolls of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists.

EuroPhilEx Birmingham 2025 is being organised by the Association of British Philatelic Societies in conjunction with Stamp World Exhibitions Ltd, and has FEPA patronage and FIP (International Federation of Philately) recognition.



# A Report, Message and Comment from the North West Federation

Trafford Philatelic Society was delighted to welcome exhibitor and dealer **Bill Barrell** to our 19<sup>th</sup> November meeting in Timperley, north Cheshire.

Each year normally, the North West Federation of Philatelic Societies invites an esteemed speaker to give the Paul Gaywood lecture. Paul was the president of the federation, but died very suddenly in 2017. Previous lecturers have included **Chris Taft** of the National Postal Museum, and **Hugh Jeffries** of Stanley Gibbons (both talks given at Trafford PS). We were delighted to welcome guests from other local philatelic societies, so we had a good number of attendees, which was very encouraging.

Bill Barrell, as we all know, is a great speaker, and always presents first class material. His display for us was his large gold medal winning exhibit from Hafnia on GB Postal Reform. It seemed to this observer that every single item he showed was a rarity of some sort. We saw a 1d black on first day cover, the finest example of the "B Blank" error and also Archer Rouletted 1d reds, which I'd never actually seen in the



flesh, but was now treated to singles, blocks and even on cover. Another standout item was a leaflet sent to all postmasters explaining what a postage stamp looked like, but this one still had the two 1d blacks attached. Truly outstanding. Bill also brought along some of his stock for sale. I for one, couldn't let the opportunity pass. It can be my Christmas present, I told my wife. She can always return the slippers!

On another topic; I too am saddened by the drop off in members attending club meetings. It is very obvious that stamp collectors are aging, and that Royal Mail and other postal authorities are not helping by producing vast numbers of stamps which are very unlikely to appear on mail received in people's homes. Therefore young people see no relevance in stamps and so have no desire to collect them. I wish I had some answers.... Chris Hawley

#### **IDEAS FOR MEMBERSHIP GROWTH**

#### If what you're doing isn't working, try something new

I joined Maidenhead Philatelic Society (MDPS) in April 2024 and was recently made Secretary. At our social recently, I was given a copy of ABPS news from Winter 2023 with a suggestion that I contact you given the comments in the "Notes from the Chair" and "Editorial" sections about the future of societies and new members.

At the Maidenhead & District Philately Society AGM on May 21<sup>st</sup> someone asked, "How do we get more members?" This echoed a similar question in issue 22 of Henley Stamp News "At the Henley Stamp Club we are asking and seeking ways to get new members – has anyone got any bright ideas?" and a sentiment expressed by the outgoing President in the RPSL's 2022 Annual Accounts namely "One sadness is the depletion in numbers of members ..."

This document aims to address these comments. it comprises seven sections covering all aspects of membership of a philatelic society, followed by a section comprising a list of ideas.

Although you might be tempted to go straight to the ideas, reading sections 2 to 8 first will provide the context and explanation to the ideas listed in section 9.

Section 2 - THE EXISTING MEMBER EXPERIENCE - Existing members are the reason that the society currently exists, so understanding their experience with the society, should provide information on what may attract new members.

Section 3 - DEFINING OUR VALUE - We need to clearly define the value of philately and membership of our society, to make membership attractive to potential members.

Section 4 - IMPROVING OUR APPEAL – We need to ensure that potential members see us in a positive manner so they are encouraged to join.

Section 5 - NEW MEMBER BENEFITS - What benefits can we offer to encourage potential members?

Section 6 - THE NEW MEMBER EXPERIENCE - We need a new member experience so that when we get new members there is a higher probability that they will stay on as active members.

Section 7 - IDENTIFYING AND REACHING POTENTIAL MEMBERS - We need to identify who we are trying to recruit so we can target how to reach them, to maximise the benefits from our resources and not waste money/effort in the wrong places.

Section 8 - PARTNERSHIPS - We need to work with the other groups which have a vested interest in the long-term strength of our hobby.

Section 9 - LIST OF IDEAS - A list of 100 ideas based on the comments in the previous sections.

There is a degree of overlap between these sections, so don't be surprised if ideas come up more than once in different sections, but (hopefully) with different explanations so it's not too repetitive.

It is important to stress, that looking at and making changes to help recruit new members is not a reflection or criticism of what the officers (who put a lot of effort into the society) have done, or are doing. Instead it's a reaction to the questions about membership growth and an attempt at constructive dialogue to encourage this.

Even if you decide not to do a membership drive, some of the ideas in this document may be beneficial (e.g. improving the websites).

One point on the cost. Most societies seem to close with money in the bank. There's no point having money in the bank if you end up with no members, so the money goes to another society – spending some of your reserves to create a longer-term future for your society is a good thing.

Some of the 100 ideas of the way forward from the current situation through a new drive are précised below, but if you need more use **editor@abps.org.uk** to send a request. The whole document is a 29-page Word document:

- Survey and involve past and existing members before, during and after the drive.
- Consider what membership of the society and philately offers. It must offer more than can be done solo.
- 3.Get feedback from anyone about your website: members, non-philatelist friends, member from other societies.
- 4. Think about the name of your society does it appeal or seem exclusive
- Consider adding personal touches to the website like meet the committee, or meet the members etc.
- 6.Consider how meetings are reported can these be more colourful and personal?
- 7.Review all the content on the website and ensure that it gives a positive image of what we do. Take out negative content, or at least make it a positive (e.g. an inherited collection may not be financially valuable but it will bring you hours of entertainment).
- 8.Demystify some of the terminology and practices with clear explanations (e.g. our website talks about a circulating packet I had no idea what it meant and couldn't find any explanation on the website).
- 9. Create a new member offering: prepare a welcome pack; offer a mentor/buddy to help with your collection, how to collect, how to compete etc.
- 10. Welcome visitors to meetings and introduced them to everyone present and everyone present to them (only if there are more than 10 members present, would a group introduction be appropriate).
- 11.Don't try and get all and everyone to join people who join who aren't really interested are more likely to leave (and potentially say bad things about us (online) creating negative publicity).
- 12. Identify all the potential places that we could advertise for new members, Bank, Building Society, Post Office etc. community boards, libraries, local museums and Identify local groups that may be interested in being given a

- presentation Consider holding (some) meetings earlier in the day (so people who don't like travelling at night can attend).
- 13. Discuss with the Federation e.g. about support for sharing membership ideas and providing support for how to use technology etc.
- 14. Discuss with dealers on the support they would give to help with a new member campaign.
- 15. Analyse failures to learn from our mistakes.
- 16.And finally share failures and the causes with other interested parties to help them avoid making the same mistakes.



The remainder of the meeting was a presentation by Wojciech on The Most Beautiful Stamp competition held from 1963 to the present day in Czechoslovakia and the Czech Republic. Categories for the winning stamp designs tended to change – most beautiful, best series, best cover and so on. From 1965, voters received a souvenir sheet in a folder with an engraving based on the stamp design. All were

in agreement that the examples of the engraver's art shown, on the souvenir sheets and their covers in particular, displayed the artistry of Czechoslovak and Czech stamp design at its very best.

#### Malaya

Three meetings were held. 19<sup>th</sup> October and 7<sup>th</sup> December (Christmas) were at our usual venue, Spink Auction House, London WC1 and a Zoom Meeting more accessible to distant members on 23rd November. Imperial Airways started from Singapore on 1st January 1934 and during the rest of the thirties there was competition between the two airlines. KLM was more expensive, but faster and more frequent. From 1st March 1938 Empire All Up at 8c was introduced. WWII made for pooling of resources and the strategy of routes which did not fly over enemy territory. In December Susan McEwen displayed items relating to WWII. Andrew Norris showed Social History of Singapore. John Higgins brought a Postcard to Edvard Lampriere in Labuan in 1881 followed by Roger Johnson showing Postal History about Sarawak. #### **National**

Our members have enjoyed two outstanding displays by visiting speakers, one online, the other live. The online display in December was on the subject of Christmas and presented by Julian Bagwell. #### Royal

We welcomed **Thomas Mathà FRPSL** in November, giving his third presentation to us. His subject this time was the *Postal History of the Italian Islands*, showing the origin and development of the organised postal service to the islands, concentrating on the mail connecting the islands with the mainland. The presentation was divided into groups of islands: Maritime islands including Sicily and Sardinia; Lagoon islands in the Adriatic Sea; Lake islands; River islands. The display of *China: 300 Years of Decline, Struggle and Revival* given by **Danny Kin Chi Wong FRPSL** was filled with incredible covers and letters,

1810-1880, the material on show was truly exceptional. Every aspect was covered, from the moves for postal reform, the development of the Penny Black including entries in the Treasury Competition, the issued line-engraved penny stamps, the Penny Black, including concerns

ranging from the Imperial Courier Post of 1644 to 1912, up to the unification of Hong Kong on 30<sup>th</sup> June 1997 and of Macao on 20<sup>th</sup> December 1999. The display given by **Bill Barrell FRPSL** in December was probably the finest seen for many years of classic Great Britain. Titled *Great Britain – Postal Reform and Development of the Penny Value*

of fraudulent re-use of stamps to the subsequent Penny Red. There is a wealth of material that can be collected from the Channel Islands, as was shown on the occasion of the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of **the CISS**. We saw a fascinating insight as to why these islands offer so much to collectors.

#### **West Indies**

Our positive news is about **Simon Richard's** recently published book *Dominica Philately to 1967*. As president, Simon took up **Victor Toeg's** 1994 commitment (as former president) to another volume on other aspects of Dominica philately. The result is a comprehensive review of all things philatelic for Dominica up until 1967. Evidence of the island's postal history begins with a French letter written by MG Mayne St Luce from Loubiere on 8<sup>th</sup> April 1795 to Captain Brough of the Royal Marines, HMS Panther. Ship Letters, early Packet Letters, French occupation and the introduction of date stamps are all carefully detailed in a manner that provides a good insight into the issues affecting many Caribbean islands at the time. The book covers postmarks, post offices, stamps and postal stationery. In summary it is a thorough and captivating read that will delight any Caribbean collector. #### **Haverfordwest**

An interesting afternoon was spent focussing on the theme of Shipwrecks. With all members living either on the Pembrokeshire coast or not far from it. our displays are often connected to the sea. The session was led by **Ken Watson**, whose idea it was to use this theme. Ken showed many postcards of ships that had been wrecked and spoke knowledgeably about the circumstances involved inspired by his experience of being a merchant seaman. Members were asked to bring along items of any kind associated with the subject - not just philatelic. They included a large map showing all the shipwrecks there were around the Pembrokeshire coast (over 200 in all); books about shipwrecks; postcards of various disasters and a presentation about the *Titanic*. Some members shared their memories of the Sea Empress oil spill disaster in 1996, when the ship became grounded on mid-channel rocks at the entrance to Milford Haven. Over the course of one week, she spilt 72 000 tons of crude oil into the sea, which is within the Pembrokeshire Coast National Park - one of Europe's most important wildlife and conservations areas. Much of the Pembrokeshrire coastline recovered relatively quickly. Five years on, the affected marine wildlife population levels had more or less returned to normal. However the memories of the events have endured in people's minds. Erene Grieve

#### Huddersfield

In October Tony Plumbe introduced Nyasaland Airmails: Connecting 'Darkest

Africa' 1911-53. He reminded us that Nyasaland (now Malawi) is located in the East African Rift Valley. He told how the rail lines had regularly been disrupted (and moved) by earth tremors. Nyasaland has never had a direct air connection with England (and still doesn't!). Tony included the first scheduled internal airmail service from 1938. two of the three known covers addressed to Nyasaland from the 1939 'Challenger' crash and concluded with covers from 1939-44 Trans-Atlantic and Wartime Mails. In November Graham Winters began with Goats: the most important animals in the world. He looked at the animals themselves and breeds of goats - there are a lot! Apparently there are more stamps showing a Chamois goat than any other type. Finally, he included goats in history, religion and mythology. He followed with Silk Postcards with Butterfly Motifs. These cards

are often linked with WWI. Some were produced before and after this. Although postcards, they were not designed - because of their fragility - to be sent through the post as cards. Rather, they were purchased in a grease-proof envelope and then posted in another envelope. Perhaps, unsurprisingly, few of the grease-proof envelopes survive, and even fewer of the outer covers! In December, Brian Wilkinson's theme was American Indians on stamps and postcards; Charles Squire presented QEII Regionals and Tony Plumbe introduced Nigerian Artwork, mainly derived from the Michael & Sylvia Goaman archive.

#### Lewisham

In November 2024 members enjoyed an unusual presentation by **Geoff Hanney** on *Haitian Philately*. Haiti was originally inhabited by the Carib people who were virtually wiped out by waves of Spanish, French and English settlers, following in the wake of Columbus. Achieving independence in 1804, the country struggled

to settle into successful self-government, so involvement by France and Great Britain continued. Pre-stamp covers were shown with marks applied in both French- and British-run post offices. When stamps first appeared, this continued, with stamps sent out from France and England to the respective offices. In 1881 Haiti decided to join the UPU and ordered its first set of stamps – the 'Liberty Head' design – from a French company. Unstable government led to regular changes of President – and each time there were overprints and new stamp issues. Forgeries abound – a favourite early 20<sup>th</sup> century pastime, aimed at collectors rather than postal

users. These include inverted overprints, 'missing heads', and erroneous perforations. Around 1900 the American Banknote Company got involved – but the administration was not good at paying their bills. From 1914 until the early 1930s US troops were in the country and virtually took over the administration, including finance and the postal service. All in all, Haiti was a fascinating focus for philatelists seeking something out of the ordinary – provided you are not insistent on establishing whether *all* your stamps are genuine: after all, some (like those created by Fournier) are probably worth more than the real stamps!

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#### Lostock

# **Newcastle Upon Tyne**

In December member **Stephen Dixon** presented a picture postcard display entitled *Anglo-Egyptian Sudan: The Condominium*. The display consisted of 10 frames with over 300 picture postcards on show. The story of early Sudan was illustrated through the medium of contemporary black and white ppcs based upon photographs taken mainly by locally-based photographers. Many were related to news events, and if commercially viable were subsequently produced as postcards. These helped to put the story into context, giving an insight into the developments which took place in Sudan over a 20-year period. From the

early beginnings of the Condominium the exhibit illustrated aspects of the plans set out by the Sudan administration. Part 1 set the scene by examining the governance, secretariat, justice, defence and the Sudanese involvement. With Khartoum in ruins, its construction was featured in 'Khartoum: The Early Years ', telling the story of progress with building and development work. Subsequent parts described the many tribes and ethnic groups forming the indigenous people of Sudan - their working lives and cultures. The Governor-Generals feature and their contribution is noted by the news event picture postcards issued. The story of the creation of Port Sudan is covered along with the development of Omdurman and Khartoum North. Although the focus was on the principal urban areas, the hinterland

beyond Khartoum was represented. In the final frames the focus moved to the Garrison of Sudan and its composition. *Phil Burn*

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
