This is just one example of the active role played by ABPS in the organisation of the hobby. I often get frustrated that some



individuals say that they are unaware of ABPS or their activities, so I have taken this opportunity to highlight some of the **Key Achievements of ABPS in the last twelve months:** 

- Complete review of the Speakers database (and website update)
- Ongoing update of the ABPS website with news and information. Have you looked at the ABPS website recently?
- New project started for a "Learn" Module on the website
- ABPS News magazine circulated quarterly, showcasing local, national and specialist societies
- Executive Bulletin circulated quarterly to share news and best practice with societies
- Financial support for Stamp Active's youth programme
- Provision of a meeting room for societies at Stampex
- Small Grants support for local societies, such as grants towards AV equipment
- Award of the Congress Medal and Awards of Merit to recognise personal contributions to philately
- Organisation of the Philatelic Congress of Great Britain, held in Southampton
- Organisation of the national stamp competition, held for the first time at the Royal Philatelic Society London, viewed by 400 visitors
- Organisation of the national stamp competition at York
- Organisation of UK Commissioners for International Exhibitions

- Training courses for Exhibitors and Federation/National Judges
- Organisation of the EuroPhilEx International Exhibition, to be held in Birmingham in 2025

## An Appreciation

I'm not sure when I first met John. I think it was when I was Treasurer of the Yorkshire Philatelic Association in the late 1980s, and he was the Rotherham PS delegate. He worked for the National Provincial Bank and knew my uncle, Herbert Hindle, who was the manger of the Broomhill branch in Sheffield in the 1950s where John worked, which helped develop our friendship.

John joined Sheffield PS in 1997, although, as a member of Rotherham PS and the Yorkshire Postal History Society,



he was well known to us as he was a regular visitor to Sheffield with intersociety visits.

He then acted as delegate for both Sheffield and Rotherham for the Yorkshire Philatelic Association, becoming their President for the 2001-02 season. He gave many displays around the county. He won many Sheffield and YPA competitions, eventually graduating to national and international level. He signed the Roll of Distinguished Yorkshire Philatelists in 2005. His only term as President of Sheffield was in the 2004-05 season.

His knowledge of philately was quite extensive. John was always very generous with his time and always willing to help. He was an eloquent speaker when giving his displays, which made them even more interesting.

He was an avid collector including displays of Rotherham Postal History, Bavaria, and several "offshoot" collections. He gave many displays to us, either as President of Sheffield, President of the Yorkshire Philatelic Association or as an invited speaker.

In the latter years of his life, his attention was drawn to Free Fronts, especially those signed by Yorkshire MPs and clergy. He wrote a book on the GB Failed Free Hand Stamps of the Franking System with R B Galland as well as writing articles about special cancellations used by the Royal Mail to validate the use of the free post system.

Although he was unable to attend meetings over the last few years, several of our members kept in touch either on the phone or by visits to his home. His knowledge and friendship will be missed by all who knew him.

About The Author ▶ Andrew found his Father's stamps at the age of 10. A year later at Senior School he immediately joined the School Stamp Club. He 'specialised'(I) in British, but soon was interested in Queen Victoria which he could not afford. The 2nd to last boy wearing short trousers in his school year, he religiously bought Post Office New Issues on Tuesdays with his pocket money. He soon found that he enjoyed swapping / trading stamps as much as collecting them. Aged 19, eschewing University he quickly found a philatelic career in London, leading to creating his own companies in stamps. Andrew has authored many internationally published Stamp 'Tips' articles, appearing on Local Radio and National TV promoting Philately with Alan Titchmarsh. Andrew's area of expertise is unusual - in so far as his grounding in collecting and wide philatelic knowledge has given him a deep understanding of Philately. He has studied Philately for the past 51 years, in combination with Commerce and Marketing Expertise, enabling him to create synergies in 'lifetime' interlinked Stamp Selling Systems, selling unit-priced stamps through to handling collections & Rarities up to £700,000 each. Today Andrew is fortunate to be co-owner with his Wife, of Universal Philatelic Auctions (aka UPA) - the Largest No Buyer's Premium Reducing-Estimate System Stamp Auction in the World, creating records selling stamps to 2.261 different bidders

from 54 different countries in his international auctions.
Andrew stopped collecting stamps aged 18 reasoning that his onlyment of stamps would be in handling them and selling them... It didn't occur to me that they were probably Auction Bidding Agents, paid by absent (dealer) bidders to represent them. I wondered why two collectors sitting side by side muttered to each other "he's a dealer" as if that justified him paying the highest price...

...but did it really? What was the real reason? How could a Dealer pay a higher price than a Collector? It doesn't make sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless... for a Collector, this was...

Wrong Presentation Wrong Place X
therefore Wrong Price X

3 Fast-forward 48 years later to a British Empire collection, lot #1 in an International Stamp Auction – Estimated at £3,000, but we were the highest bidder at £21,000 – YES – some 7×higher. Including Buyer's Premium in the extraordinary sum of £4,788 we actually paid GBP£25,788= upon a £3,000 estimate... however, we broke it down into sets, singles, minicollections etc. We made a profit. Some might say it found its price. Others may say:

– Lucky for the seller that 2 well-heeled bidders saw the potential value that day or it could have been given away... the seller could easily have lost out couldn't he? or she?

So, by un-peeling the layers of obfuscation, hopefully we can all agree:

The Secret is Simple – it's ALL ABOUT : TIMING

Plus the 3 Philatelic 'P's Presentation Place And Price

4 Understanding the problem... always remember the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea, I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion' in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there...

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied — "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my answer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy more collector clients than any other stamp auction

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover – up to £200,000 per annum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell £200K per annum).

5 Why is that? Because, as the world revolved the Stamp Market, imperceptibly Changed, and incrementally -Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock – but absent collectors in the place they choose to sell their stamps in. Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our former competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 77th Auction we had 1.793 different bidders from 49 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other well-advertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them - you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive...

Now, let's examine the cost implications - Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for £800. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays £1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into £2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the £800 sale price. This is GBP£144. Therefore you receive approaching £656 - which is approximately 33% of the dealer's £2,000+/- retail selling price - BUT... now that we have identified the problem...

#### Isn't the Solution Staring us Right in The Face ?

Why Pay an Auction to Sell to Dealers: Sell to Collectors instead? In our example with buyer's premium, sellers commission, lotting fees, extra credit card charges, VAT and even insurance - you're already being charged in different ways up to 40% of the selling price to sell, possibly or probably, to the wrong person.

Why not direct that 40% cost you're paying to sell to Collectors instead? Sounds good, so why hasn't this been done before?

**8** Truth is, it Has been done before...Sometimes the 'old' ways are the best ways aren't they? But in today's enthusiasm to obscure the

obvious so that money may be taken, almost surreptitiously, in numerous different ways, (without us apparently noticing until we see the cheque in our pocket) - the transparent 'seller pays' has been deliberately 'obscured' - so much so that, amazingly, the latest 2017 European Auction Selling Legislation just introduced - now requires auctions that charge 'buyer's premiums' to warn the buyer in advance. Just imagine going into the petrol station, and being warned that the price you're paying to put fuel in you tank is not the real price, you have to pay a premium! Obviously, there would be an uproar...

9 How can you cut out the middleman and sell Collectors instead? Well, I can think of two ways. 1). DIY - Do It Yourself selling on eBay. That may be fine for lower grade material - but, would you risk auctioning relatively unprotected rare material on eBay ? We don't and we're professionals, so we should know what we're doing. Or 2). Cut out the extra middle-man. Use my company UPA, which reaches collectors instead. Here's how it works: Continuing from our previous Example:

The auction sold your stamps to a dealer for £1,000 - but You received circa £656

No client is treated like a number and no client is forced like a square peg into a round hole.

## 15 OK, What Do I Do Next?

- a). You contact UPA to discuss with Andrew or a highly-qualified Auction Valuer/Describer what you have to dispose of and your options bearing in mind your specific interests / requirements
- b). If you wish, get a 2nd opinion, but investigate what type of auction / dealer you are dealing with. Is it a Dealer's auction with relatively few collectors? Can you see where / how the Dealer sells? If you can't easily see any pricelists or high quality selling catalogues that Dealer may sell your stamps to other dealers...
- c). Finally you ask U P A to collect your stamps, insure in transit for an estimated replacement retail value...

What Happens then! A member of my Team telephones/e-mails you to confirm safe receipt. 'Overnight' valuations, unless simple, are rare. Valuing stamp collections that have taken tems of years to create takes time. Depending upon your priorities / timescale I, or an experienced member of my Team will contact you to discuss your requirements and the options available to you for the sale of your collection. Provided only that you feel well-informed and comfortable do we agree strategy

How Strong is the Stamp and Cover Market? Everybody knows that the strongest areas are GB and British Empire, Post-Independence / QEII material sells but if hinged at considerable discount. Mint hinged material pre 1952 is regarded as the industry 'norm' and therefore desirable - but genuine never-hinged commands a premium. Europe sells but at reduced levels, Americas is good, as generally is Asia but the 'heat' has come off China which is still good - and Russia which can still be good. East Europe is weaker. Overall, Rarities throughout can command their own price levels and real Postal History has good demand.

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## The Irish Village at The 1908 Franco-British Exhibition, The 1909 Imperial Exhibition & The 1910 Japan-British Exhibition at White City

The village of Ballymaclinton was a popular attraction at all three Exhibitions being modelled on a typical Irish village of its time. The cost of construction was £50 000 being financed by McClintons Soaps to promote their products. The village consisted of an ancient Irish Cross together with a Castle and Tower with a Blarney Stone, Church, Village & Concert Halls and Cottages to house members of staff and for housing the Cottage Industries which were part of Irish life.

The Village was staffed by over 200 colleens who were artisans. hostesses and guides. For the first two years the village had a fully functioning Post Office where visitors could buy postcards of the village to send to family and friends. When posted through the Irish Village Post Box, these postcards received a Special Postmark, Ballymaclinton Shepherds Bush Exhibition which was applied from the 10<sup>th</sup> July to the 31<sup>st</sup> October 1908. Two handstamps were supplied to the Post Office. They differed only in the

spacing of letters in the word "Shepherds". The following year the Village reopened as part of the 1909 Imperial Exhibition with the visitors being offered a postcard with an alternative view of the Post Office which could be purchased to receive a re-dated special postmark which was used

from the 1<sup>st</sup> June to the 2<sup>nd</sup> October 1909.

The final year of the Irish Village at White City was 1910 The Japan - British Exhibition but in a reduced form with the loss of the Concert Hall, Carpet Factory Cottages and the Post Office. The General Shop survived to sell souvenirs etc and Postcards which received the Japan–British Exhibition Postmark (applied at the Paddingtn Chief District Post Office) when posted at

the shop. The number of Ballymaclinton postcards in circulation bearing an Exhibition postmark is less than in previous years and those receiving Japan-

## 150 years of the Universal Postal Union


Further to an initial exploratory meeting in Paris in 1863 called by Montgomery Blair (USA) a second meeting of national postal authorities was convened in Berne in 1874 instigated by Heinrich von Stephan (Confederation of German States). The outcome was the formation of the General Postal Union and a treaty was signed by the interested parties on 9<sup>th</sup> October in that year. This organisation was renamed the Universal Postal Union in 1878. So began



the international administration body for the world's postal system based in Berne. Congresses were held every four years in various host countries to

progress affairs.

In 1900 on the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary Switzerland issued three stamps to commemorate the UPU. The extraordinary meeting called over the period 2<sup>nd</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup> July 1900 set aside funds for the building of a

monument to the UPU which was unveiled on 4<sup>th</sup> October 1909.

This iconic statue in the park became the recognised "logo" of the UPU world wide.

Commemorative stamps were issued by some member countries in 1924 (Jubilee), in 1949 (75 years) and by virtually all the membership in 1974 for the centenary.

Most collectors of any country will doubtless have these in their portfolio.

This year 2024 the Universal Postal Union celebrates 150 years and on 9<sup>th</sup> October, which is designated World Post Day it will begin a themed event centred in Berne based on its 150 year logo.

Some countries have already issued stamps including our Isle of Man. Where is the GB issue? Maybe Star Wars and Peppa Pig have precedence!

## **A Cautionary Tale**

or

## You Can't Trust the Value of a Stamp.

When we go to the Post Office to buy a stamp (even though they want us to buy a label instead) we hand over a sum of money and pick up the stamp. Sometimes it has an actual value on it – 20p, 50p etc but often it has just 2<sup>nd</sup> or 1<sup>st</sup> to show that it will pay the standard charge for a 2<sup>nd</sup> Class letter or a 1<sup>st</sup> Class letter. It might be a 2<sup>nd</sup> Large or 1<sup>st</sup> Large and so available to send a Large Letter by the appropriate class.

Now I, and possibly others, thought that the value of the stamp 85p, £1.65, £1.55 or £2.60 was retained by the stamp until Royal Mail in their wisdom (or lack of it) decided to increase the charges again. So I could use a 1<sup>st</sup> Class stamp to send something 2<sup>nd</sup> Class – augmented by suitable additional stamps to make the going rate for whatever I wanted to send or vice versa.

Yes – but – some sorting office officials see a 1<sup>st</sup> Class Stamp and say that clearly means that the item is to travel 1<sup>st</sup> Class. What happens if there are two stamps on the envelope – one 1<sup>st</sup> Class, one 2<sup>nd</sup> Class? That can happen easily if you want to send a 2<sup>nd</sup> Class Large Letter<250g. The cost is £2.50 – easy - one of each of the two standard stamps. One person at my local Post Office told me that you cannot use both types on one envelope - the stamps were already on there so I persisted. The item made it in one piece so clearly half didn't go 1<sup>st</sup> Class and the other half 2<sup>nd</sup> Class.

BUT - See this correspondence:

Message to me from Rory:

Perhaps others have informed you, or maybe the Royal Mail didn't check all the copies of the ABPS News, but I had to pay a fee of £1.50 to get my copy as it was over the first weight step, being about 110 grams.

After our response came a note of what had been received by Rory from Royal Mail when the matter was raised with them:

I have at last had a reply from Royal Mail. Their take on this is that there was no indication from the sender that it was to go by Second Class mail and he had stuck a First Class stamp on it so they assumed he wanted it to go by First Class post and therefore was underpaid at 110gms.

I don't necessarily accept this statement as I don't know if there are any Royal Mail procedures for handling apparently underpaid items, but their argument is reasonable.

Of course it took longer to reach me than First Class should have because they had to process it and I had to pay before they would deliver it.

I remember that in the old days when first and second class post was introduced we usually wrote on the cover what class we intended. I think that we need to still do that and not leave them to decide.

We have agreed with this as being the best way in future, until the rates change and we do not get the overlap of a Large 1<sup>st</sup> Class Letter <100grams being charged the same as a 2<sup>nd</sup> Class Large Letter < 250grams (as it was at the time

that the Autumn issue was sent out). Now of course the 1<sup>st</sup> Class rates have all increased so the overlap doesn't happen - but watch out! HOWEVER - you might be lucky and come across an official with common sense:

From another correspondent, Michael:

I received my ABPS News Autumn 2024 magazine yesterday. However, before I received it I received a card from Royal Mail to say that I had a package for which I owed £1.50. I went to our local Royal Mail delivery office to collect it and the person behind the desk brought it to me and there was a yellow label on it with a "FEE TO PAY £1.50" and the box "Underpaid – Format" ticked. He looked at the envelope and said it had a 1st Class Large stamp on it and couldn't understand why such a label had been placed on it. It did not feel too heavy and not too large. Anyway he declined to accept the £1.50 and simply said he would mark it refused and let me have it!

So where do we go from here:

- 1. Put the service that you want on the envelope or packet
- 2. Don't let the person behind the counter bully you into buying what you don't want or need.
- 3. Stay Calm and try to be reasonable even when they aren't!
- 4. Don't pay their punitive charges without a fight (verbal and polite, not abusive and physical).
- 5. You can always refuse the item especially if you think that you probably didn't want it in any case!
- 6. Ask not to have ABPS News as a printed copy digital is quicker, easier, cheaper and for other things send emails, texts etc until Royal Mail and the Post Office have to be taken back into public ownership or just close down.

A bit drastic that last one perhaps but at least we won't have all those strange stamps being produced that we cannot get from our local Post Office, WH Smiths, Corner Shop or whatever tries to keep the service going.

His display led us through the development of photography from the pioneers of the early 1800s all the way to the holographic images found on some modern stamps. He told us how it had been pointed out to the Post Office in the very early days of the penny black era that photography might provide a means of forgery, depriving the authorities of revenue. This was dismissed as unlikely. We heard stories of early experiments and saw two covers addressed to Henry Fox-Talbot, one of the pioneers of the science of photography. The advent of cinematography led to the famous sequence of a galloping horse, which settled arguments as to the horse's gait. Our second visitor was **Steve Harrison**, showing a potted history of *The Philatelic Congress of Great Britain 1909 to 1946*. A wealth of illustrative material included labels from Perkins Bacon in the early years, De La Rue and of course, Harrison. Material from the 1911 Birmingham Congress included

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followed by a short-lived federation and its breakdown, then independence for Malawi and Zambia and the turmoil of Southern Rhodesia. The whole display comprised postal stationery of all classes and rates. In September the speaker was **David Hatwell** whose subject was *London's Stamp Centre-Selfridges 1931-*

1939. David opened by outlining the early life of Harry Gordon Selfridge, an American who worked for the Marshall Field department stores, working his way up through the ranks to senior positions until able to come to London in 1908 and open his own store, Selfridges, on Oxford

Street. In 1909 after Louis Bleriot's flight across the Channel his monoplane went on display at Selfridges. David showed a postcard featuring Bleriot and his plane. During the Jubilee and Coronation celebrations of 1935 and 1937 the Selfridges building was elaborately decorated. David showed superb coloured illustrations of the decorations. In 1931 Selfridges established a stamp department and was instrumental in publishing the Stamp Magazine. The stamp department was also active in the production of first day covers. Despite David's research the Selfridges archivists said the stamp department did not exist!! The department closed in 1939. David then showed an almost complete collection of the 1937 Coronation first day covers produced by Selfridges. He encouraged discussion on the possibility of some of the postmarks being forged. No conclusions were reached!

## Leeds

Our 2024-25 season opened with a *Variety Night* by **Rick Rickwood** on September 10<sup>th</sup>, when he showed *Pre-stamp material from 1720 up to the Penny Post*. # **West Riding**

Our 2024 season of informal meetings continued with displays in September including one by **Tony Plumbe** with *Nyasaland WWI and WWII censored mail*. He covered incoming, outgoing and transit military, concessionary and civilian

mail. Tony explained during WWI Nyasaland was a supply route to German East Africa, Germany (Schutztruppe) attempted to cut the rail line along this route which was prevented by actions of the Belgian and British forces with local Askari, South African and Southern Rhodesian – about 45 000 troops, Numbers of troops in the area from many different nations generated civil, military, POW and Red Cross mail - examples of which were contained in the display: many of these items being scarce. WWII generated a situation of civilian and military censors which was introduced immediately on the outbreak of war. The display contained examples of "Q" code cachets and applied paper seals. Tony had formed a study of the various types of cachets and tapes used and mails sent via Thomas Cook & Son London. He explained that examples of military censorship of mail within Nyasaland are scarce because their troops were moved to Kenya, however that did generate more inward censored mail. We saw examples of Army A600 shield, East Africa Command type cachets and POW/Red Cross covers. Examples of the various postage rates in use at the time produced a colourful display of the variety of stamps applied together with censor tapes and cachets. Adrian Lee

# **Joint Central European Societies Meeting**

It was another

## Malaya

# The Royal

The new season began traditionally with a display of material from the Royal Philatelic Collection shown by gracious permission of His Majesty King Charles III. As always, it was a great privilege for members to see this fine material which this year focused on *The Region of West Africa*, including Gambia, Gold Coast, Nigeria and Sierra Leone. There were stamps from the reigns from Queen Victoria to King George VI, with many overprinted SPECIMEN. For the next meeting **Jonas Hällström** focused *On War.* It was based on his personal collection, an array of postal and philatelic material brought together without concern for the rules that determine what is shown in competitive exhibits. This thematic collection reflects Jonas' professional background, as a Lieutenant Colonel in the Swedish Armed Forces, and the renowned work *Vom Kriege* ('On War') by the Prussian General, Carl von Clausewitz. This work, although





unfinished at his death in 1831, is regarded as a seminal treatise on military strategy and science and is still studied today. In October a most comprehensive presentation of the first issues of India, from 1852 to 1854, was given by **Pragya Jain**. He detailed the early stamp issues from the first postage stamp of India, the Scinde District Dawk of 1852 and continued with the stamps printed by lithography, the half anna, one anna and two annas, each in a single colour, and the four annas printed in two colours.

### South African Collectors'

We enjoyed an excellent Zoom meeting in September with interesting and

informative displays from Hugh Amoore (SA), Rob Lester (UK) and Keith Klugman (USA). A successful and cosmopolitan event. Later despite travel obstacles, eighteen members and guests attended a day meeting in Letchworth. This was hosted by Bob Hill, with able assistance from Lyn and Rob Lester. There were two exceptional six-frame displays. One, by Ian Shapiro showed original material from the Royal Visit to South Africa in 1947; the other, by Dr Daana Strydom, was of original artwork, proofs and stamps of the 1885 Vurtheim issue of the Transvaal. 

# **BOOK REVIEW**

by Ken Sandford GRAF ZEPPELIN LZ-127 SOUTH AMERICA AIRMAIL – 1930 – 1937

International Philatelic Exhibit, by Brian Callan

The book details the flights of the Graf Zeppelin LZ-127 airship to and from South America using the flight covers contained in the author's philatelic exhibit of the same name. The book allows additional information to be added that exhibit space does not allow. The major purpose and intent of the book is to preserve the details of the exhibit and in particular the postage rates associated with the flights illustrated. The book also details the history of this airship, which

was the most successful of its time, flying for nine years without fatality or significant issues.

The book shows the Exhibit Title Page and then has five sections, as follows:

Section 1 – 1930 & 1931 Pre-commercial South America flights

Section 2 – 1932 Launch of commercial scheduled flights to South America

Section 3 – 1933 Commercial flights, including Century of Progress flight

Section 4 – 1934 Commercial flights, including only flight to Argentina

Section 5 – 1935 to 1937 DLH aircraft support services

There are three appendices.

Appendix 3: Index by country

# NEW BOOK PUBLISHED BY THE ROYAL PHILATELIC SOCIETY LONDON

The Postal Stationery of Nigeria by Peter Horlyck Published November 2023

ISBN 978-1-913015-27-5 Retail price £54 RPSL Members' Price £49

This new book, written by the sadly recently deceased author and completed by his long-time collaborator Ray Harris, provides an in-depth study of the postal stationery in all forms produced in or for Nigeria.

The book starts by being divided into broad geographic areas within Nigeria. There are chapters on Lagos, Niger Coast, Northern Nigeria, Southern Nigeria, Nigeria 1914-1960 and Nigeria 1960 – 2000. It does not cover more recent items. It then considers specific types of artefacts: Postal Orders, Reply Coupons, UPU Specimens and Cut-outs, before returning to geography with chapters on the Cameroons under First World War British administration, and another on Biafra. There are Appendices relating to De La Rue archives, Crown Agent archives, British Post Office archives, Government gazettes, essavs and proofs in private hands plus a list of known scarce items (a unique feature of the book is its attempt at a rarity assessment). Each chapter is profusely illustrated and is supported by helpful author comments about the history, rarity and/or provenance of particular items, including of course postcards, aerogrammes, and registered envelopes. The book is extremely well-written and has obviously been the subject of a lifetime of study; it includes many interesting personal anecdotes as well as well-researched commentary on the items under consideration. Production and sales figures are given wherever possible. Numerous footnotes and references can be found in every chapter.

The book ends with a bibliography and a brief index.

Who is the book aimed at? Obviously, it will be of great interest to those who collect Nigerian philately in any form, but it also is a role model for any postal stationery enthusiast, whatever country they are looking at, thanks to its wealth of ideas on the types of items to collect and how to analyse what one has collected.

# Entries Invited for the 2025 National Stamp Competition

The ABPS London National Competitive Exhibition 2025 will be held from 27<sup>th</sup> February to 1<sup>st</sup> March 2025 at The Royal Philatelic Society, 15 Abchurch Lane, London EC4N 7BW.

This is a National Exhibition, open to all exhibitors who are resident in the United Kingdom and from other countries who are affiliated to FIP or FEPA. Overseas entries are very welcome as well as those from the UK. This exhibition provides an opportunity for people to qualify for entry to international exhibitions if they achieve at least 80 points (Large Vermeil).

Entrants can select on the online entry form whether their exhibit is competitive or non-competitive, so if you do not want your entry to be judged but still want to share your passion for a particular collecting area, this is the opportunity to do so.

The exhibition is open to applications in the following classes:

Traditional Philately Cinderella Class Postal History
Picture Postcard Class Aerophilately Ephemera Class
Postal Stationery Non-Competitive Display Class Revenue Philately
Three-Dimensional Class (for philatelic ephemera) Thematic Philately
Open Philately Astrophilately Maximaphily Literature.

A competitive entry may be 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 or 8 frames each made-up of 16 standard display sheets or equivalent. No pre-qualification is needed for 1-5 frames. Exhibits awarded (at least) 80 points and large vermeil at a previous national exhibition may increase to 8 frames at the exhibitor's discretion.

Anyone who is entering the national exhibition for the first time will not be charged an entry fee thanks to the support of ABPS and the Philatelic Fund, providing they are a member of a society affiliated to ABPS, or a Friend or Patron of ABPS. This offer also applies to individuals who enter an International Exhibition for the first time. All others will be charged £25 per frame for the national competition.

# American Philatelic Society Warns Public of Fraudulent Online Store

The American Philatelic Society, a trusted name in the stamp collecting community, is issuing a warning to the public about a rogue online store, *www.superstampcenter.com*, that is engaging in fraudulent activities. This website has been found to be cloning the online stores and product descriptions of legitimate businesses, including the <u>APS Stamp Store</u>, other reputable sellers on HipStamp and eBay.

### **Fraudulent Activities Identified:**

- 1. Cloning of Online Stores: The rogue website has copied the layout, design, and content of legitimate online stamp stores.
- 2. Fake Product Listings: They are posting products they do not possess, using descriptions and images from authentic sellers.
- 3. **Discounted Prices:** These fraudulent items are often listed at significantly discounted prices to lure unsuspecting buyers.
- 4.**Impact on Consumers:** Customers who purchase from this fraudulent site risk receiving counterfeit products or no products at all, leading to financial loss and disappointment. We urge the public to exercise caution and verify the authenticity of online stores before making any purchases.

### **Steps to Protect Yourself:**

- 1. Verify Website Authenticity: Check the URL and ensure it matches the official website of the seller.
- 2.**Inspect the Business Operators:** Check the business organization pages of the website to see if it seems a legitimate business. Such website pages might include the following: about, contact, customer service, returns, and shipping.
- 3. Look for Reviews: Search for reviews and feedback from other customers.
- 4.**Contact the Seller:** Reach out to the seller directly through verified contact information.
- 5. Report Suspicious Activity: If you encounter a suspicious website, report it to the relevant authorities.

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
